After dinner, we again went to the ETOC finals and were entertained by some awesome flying again.



Not only are they both working on 1/3 scale Balsa USA kits (Eric has the Fokker D-7 and Jer has the Sopwith Pup), they're also both building 30% Lasers that were flown by Leo Loudenslager. I might add that they both attended a session where they learned how to cut foam wing cores and fuselages that was taught by a member of the Model Masters, Brad Quick. Jer offered a free lunch to the person who could complete the project they worked on at the session, a foam Piper Cherokee from construction foam bought at a hardware store, and Brad's father Lloyd won by completing and flying it in two days !!!

Jon Caywood is still working on and improving the hexacopter. This is an amazing vehicle that is run on six brushless motors arranged in the shape of a three bladed prop with the controls in the center and a brushless motor on top and bottom at the tip.
